



CLUB HISTORY

The Port Bouvard Surf Lifesaving Club commenced patrols at Pyramids Beach in Dawesville on 18th December 2003. At that time, it started with 21 members of which 9 were active on patrol. The following season in November 2004 the Club commenced a Nipper's program with 18 children aged between 5 and 13 years of age.

On 26th May 2006 the Club gained full affiliation with Surf Life Saving Western Australia (SLSWA). Since that time the Club has gone from strength to strength and is now recognised as a functional Surf Club that is successfully providing a range of services in the Peel Region. These services include, Patrols and Public Safety, Training and Education both for its Members and the General Public, Competition Fitness and Health Programs and Social Interaction.

The Port Bouvard Surf Lifesaving Club is one of 31 Surf Lifesaving Clubs throughout Western Australia, and in the nearby area the Club interrelates with Mandurah, Secret Harbour and Coogee SLS Clubs.

The first level (stage one) construction of the Clubrooms at Pyramids Beach was completed in March 2010. The second level (stage two) construction commenced in December 2018 and was completed in July 2019. The official opening was on 14 September 2019.

The Club had secured funding for stage two with a nominal estimation of \$1.7 M being required. This funding as made up of a Federal Government commitment of up to \$1 M on a one third two thirds basis, State funding via the Peel Development Commission, a City of Mandurah contribution and the Clubs top up funding.

The second level addition gives the Club much needed space and a more functional premise. The Clubrooms will be available to other groups in the local community. The Club is looking at event hire in the future to raise funds for the Surf Club to continue to operate.

The semi-fixed Patrol tower that was installed last season on Pyramids Beach in front of the clubrooms, has added a greater viewing platform for increased water safety.











PRESIDENTS REPORT – John Hodges

It is my pleasure to present the Port Bouvard SLSC 2019/20 annual report and to highlight some of the achievements on what has been a very successful season of development and growth for the club. The club has continued to invest in activities that align with the pillars of not only the club but also SLSWA. There has also been immense support from our local sponsors and also those from Surf Lifesaving WA.

This year we continued to develop our infrastructure which has resulted in the completion of the 2nd Story, this has meant that we now boast first class facilities that can not only host events of up to 200 people in the purpose built function room but we also have a new training/board room, all of these facilities are complemented by unrivaled ocean views as well as an excellent viewpoint of the cut. This really is an amazing achievement for the club and brings to fruition the original vision of our founder Rik Roberts OAM and something I am very proud to have been a part of for the last 6 years. I would also like to recognise some others that were major players in the development, Mark Fenton and the building committee, Jeff Kallawk, Marcus Martin, Murray Horbury just to name a few. Also I would like to place on record our sincere thanks to John Perry and the Florida Beach development who kick started the whole thing with the initial \$50k donation. I would like to thank and recognize the Mandurah Shire who also contributed to the fund along with the Royalties for regions and the federal government.

This year the patrols were expanded with a regular set up at Falcon bay which has been well received by the general public, we have complimented this with our Jet Ski and also the IRB making regular patrols up and down the coast. The long term vision is to expand our days as well as continuing to support the recently appointed lifeguard patrols, where we boasted three of our home grown talents, Massimo Martin, Sally Peraldini and Mark Delopulos. This is an area where we will continue to try and develop our youth, to be able to support, as I firmly believe that our own local lifesavers make the best lifeguards. Port Bouvard are also great supports of the Abalone season and provide major RWC support in this area, this is especially pleasing for a club of our size that we are able to do this and a testament to the amount of trained people we now have in this area.

The club also initiated the very first Cut 2 Club swim which was well received and attended by just over 100 competitors. The feedback was that it was a very challenging but enjoyable swim. The club is looking to continue to develop this over the coming years with a view to making it one of the major sporting events in the open water swimming series so I am hugely excited to see exactly where we can take this event, I truly believe that we can make it as major an event as the Busselton jetty swim.

Our Nippers program was transformed this year with the addition of the partnership with Woodside, our numbers grew by 26% from the former year. Nippers is a massive job to organize each week and Mark and his age managers have done an excellent job with this. Every week we are greeted by big smiles and great enthusiasm, it is interesting to see how our nippers are developing into tomorrow's lifesavers. I would like to make a special mention of Josh Price whom at the age of 12 performed a rescue by using the skills he learns every weekend, well done Josh!

Surfsports had a solid year once again, this area continues to build on the strong foundations laid by our previous position holders and helpers, we continue to have good representation at events and I am pleased that we have continued with our participation in the annual pool rescue series as well as making our debut in the IRB racing program. The club is committed to continuing to grow this area and we are on a mission to transform form participation club to genuine competitor club. I would like to make mention of those who picked up the surfsports program and ran with it when it needed some assistance, this is no easy feat and has meant we continue to grow in this area. Our Youth group are a worthy bunch who never cease to amaze those around them, it is nice to see and reflect on the can do and will do attitude they have. They are a major part of our patrol and the likes of Milly and Maison giving back by becoming age managers as well. This is nice to see and also strengthens our club with succession planning for the leaders of tomorrow. This year we also participated in a weekend away with Coogee SLSC at the annual Beach Bumz Camp, I was very encouraged with the numbers we managed to put up here and thank Coogee for the invitation. Also a big thanks to Jeff Kallawk who agreed to go with them on the overnighter as well, it is an experience I do not believe he will forget in a hurry either! The annual BIG day out was once again a resounding success and I would like to thank Melissa Martyn and Eric Fawcett who work tirelessly keeping the youth interested in various other activities all year round and also join in at all of the water safety events.

The education department had a solid year in unusual circumstances with Covid19. What must be recognised is the amount of uptake we had in the Nippers Rescue Certificate from parents. This is very important and means the Nippers can have larger amounts of water time, it is also a way of getting involved in the club as we are all volunteers and always on the lookout of assistance and help. The amount of SRC's was also very pleasing and it would be remiss of me not to mention the Bronze Medallion course who despite the disruption of the course due to Covid19 continued on and managed to obtain the award. What is really pleasing here is that out of the 6 candidates 4 are parents of nippers which once again assists in the area of water safety and their involvement in the club.

The fundraising crew made up of Murray Horbury, Helen Steffen, Luise Wilkinson, Richard Cleveland, Milly Cleveland, Karen Cleveland and not forgetting our very own K9 fundraiser Maggie! They all worked hard to provide events for the nippers and parents along with street appeal and the annual Golf Day to ensure we have enough funds available to keep our wonderful club running. I would also like to thank our parents Rhiannon Jordan and Donna Dowding who took on the task of selling the Rotary Duck race tickets which also brought in much needed funds. Those mentioned above are just to name a few and I would like to thank each and every member who has contributed in fundraising for our club this year.

This year we also started our first ever Surf Babies which was initiated by Tanya Turner who simply would not take no for an answer. Her drive for this project was second to none and I am very pleased with not only how this went but how she engaged with the youth to assist with this important initiative, special thanks to Jemma, Kye and Ashley for their participation, I will be very excited to see how we can grow this within our club to get more younger children on board for this introduction to surf.



CLUB CAPTAINS REPORT – Wayne Butchart

Well that was a totally unexpected end to a season that started off so well.

We started the season well and were having really good turn outs to Patrols, our Nippers grew to our biggest numbers yet to be seen on Pyramids Beach, which was great to see all those little ones enjoying the sun & surf.

This season we started patrolling Falcon Bay, which received a very warm welcome from the public and the locals that frequent the beach. The City of Mandurah have done an awesome job with the upgrading of the beach front park land area. We look forward to continuing the Patrols at this great location in the 2020 / 2021 Season.

Another first for the club was the hosting of the Inaugural Open water CUT2CLUB Swim in January. This was a huge event to organise and we cut the numbers off at 100 competitors, which after a lot of headaches and planning issues was a huge success with two swim legs of 3.5 km for the experienced swimmers and a 2.25 km for the Age 16 and under competitors.

The water safety for this event was covered by 39 members and 2 operators from Secret Harbour SLSC and one operator from Mandurah SLSC. On the water we had five RWC's (Jet Ski's), three IRB's and two ATV's. Most competitors that I spoke to after the swim where asking if we were going to host it again, so how could we disappoint them? Yes, it's on again next January 2021, stay tuned for the dates & details.

The season that we had could not have happened without the outstanding efforts of the volunteers that put in so many hours to make sure our club runs smoothly. A huge thankyou to the EC committee, John, Karen, Tanja and Tanya as without them at the helm we would have been a rudderless ship and we all know how that ends up. Also, the efforts of the Nippers Co-Ordinator's and Age managers, again they have performed to the highest standard and I hope they are all able to come back again next season. Our fundraising committee didn't disappoint and although a lot of events had to be cancelled due to COVID19 they still put in a huge amount of time and effort to allow us to be able to get back on the beach for the season.

Once again, as a club we sent a strong contingent to Denmark for the Country Championships. Winning a few medals across the board, with many of youngsters securing a few places to compete at States, although sadly this year this was not to be.





NIPPERS REPORT - Mark Chalwell



The 2019/20 season saw the beginning of the new Woodside Nippers partnership. This brought great new equipment and a gear trailer, and also included all Nippers receiving a Woodside Nippers pack which had the Nippers looking a real standout on the beach in their fluoro vests. It also brings all age group cap colours into line with all Clubs state-wide.

Early in the season we held our first Avalon Beach Nippers session, which saw ideal calm conditions. It was a trial run and although it took a lot of organising, the feedback was very positive. We would like to look to include this again in future seasons.

Beach conditions this season were favourable for the majority of the year providing enough swell to improve the kids' confidence.


Unfortunately, due to COVID-19 our season ended abruptly, we were lucky enough to get through most of the season, having to cancel the last session and windup.

The attendance was 162 nippers, a large increase from previous season with 130 nippers achieving proficiency and attendance requirements.

Our Club and Nippers are so fortunate to having capable and excellent Age Managers that returned for another season. With growing numbers and larger age groups it is becoming beneficial to have two Age Managers / assistant and we are seeing many parents stepping up and helping. This season we had a push to recruit as many NRC qualified parents as possible to help with water safety, this was a big success! Not only were they invaluable in the water with their age group but they looked great in the Woodside hi-vis rash vest.

Very little equipment was required this year due to the Woodside sponsorship supplying us with a fully equipped gear trailer and AGL suppling more boards.

We look forward to another great season ahead with good weather and lots of nippers returning for more fun on the beach.



EDUCATION REPORT – *Tim Allingham*

Well, the season started off normally...

WINTER 2019

In the winter between the 2018 and 2019 seasons we held IRB training alongside Secret Harbour. This gives both clubs an opportunity to train with different people, measure our skills against each other and benefit from having different people run the training sessions. Sometimes it is easier to listen to people who you have not been on the beach with years and years already! It also ensures that the training is held at different beaches up and down the coast enabling the trainees to experience different beach conditions. Training happens in most types of weather too, so when someone passes their IRB driver course, you know they have done the hard yards to get there!

Becoming an IRB Driver Instructor is a significantly higher achievement. You must be able to drive the IRB confidently in <u>all</u> conditions to demonstrate the required manoeuvres. You also need to be able to explain the theory of the IRB, engine, different types of rescues and carries, and search and rescue drills whilst ensuring safety and making sure people are still having fun. Understanding what a high achievement this is, I am hugely proud to welcome Sally Peraldini and Reece Smith to join the few IRB Driver Instructors we have at the club. Despite their youth, they have shown maturity, skill and tenacity to reach this goal and I hope that they continue training for years to come.

Tim Allingham (me) also managed to achieve the WA RWC (jetski) instructor qualification in the winter of 2019/20.

SPRING / SUMMER 2019 - 2020

Tanya Turner and Jeff Kallawk led Bronze Medallion and SRC courses respectively. With it being a shorter course, Jeff managed to get the trainees assessed and qualified prior to the Christmas break. It was great to see the thirteen new SRCs in their uniform patrolling with those of us who are more "long-in-the-tooth".

The Bronze course is a more in-depth course with more water skills and theory training required. This means that it continued into the start of 2020. With the assessment day approaching, COVID-19 made its appearance in WA and the lockdowns began. Unfortunately, this affected the tail-end of the Bronze course and postponed assessment day. However, Tanya (I think we should we call her "Tenacious Tanya") stuck with the trainees and managed to organise an assessment shortly after lockdown was eased. All the trainees passed, meaning that Port Bouvard SLSC has another six Bronzies swelling its ranks and I am sure they will be delighted to be able to start patrolling in the new season.

In addition to the Bronze and SRC courses, twelve parents passed the NRC (Nippers Rescue Certificate) as new recruits and another two requalified which is an awesome result for everyone as it helps keep the nippers safer in the water and eases pressure on patrol.

AUTUMN 2020

There is not much to say about the end of the patrol season and winter as COVID-19 restrictions stopped all training activities. It has given the instructors a good break and allowed a build-up of people wanting to be trained, so hopefully the 2020/21 season will be a bumper year for new recruits.


All of these things are not possible without our amazing members; so first, let's start by saying THANK YOU to you all.


Congratulations to all those members who challenged themselves and completed a Nippers Rescue Certificate, a Surf Rescue Certificate or the Bronze Medallion.





INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE COMMITTEE OF PORT BOURVARD SURF LIFESAVING CLUB INC.

We have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report, of Port Bouvard Surf Lifesaving Club Inc. (the organisation), which comprises the Income and expenditure statement for the year ended 30 April 2020, the balance sheet as at 30 April 2020, notes comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, and the Certification by the Committee for the period then ended.

The Organisation's Responsibility for the Financial Report

The organisation is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report and has determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 is appropriate to meet the requirements of the constitution and is appropriate to meet the needs of the members. The committee's responsibilities also includes such internal control as the committee determines is necessary to enable the preparation and fair presentation of a financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial report based on our audit. We have conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Those standards require that we comply with relevant ethical requirements relating to audit engagements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial report is free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial report. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the association's preparation and fair presentation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the association's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by the committee, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial report.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Independence

In conducting our audit, we have complied with the independence requirements of Australian professional ethical pronouncements.

Qualification

As is common for organisations for this type, it is not practicable for to maintain an effective system of internal control over income and expenses prior to their initial entry into the accounting records, and therefore, no opinion is expressed on the accuracy of these amounts. However, all amounts recorded as deposits and payments have been properly reflected in the financial report. Accordingly our audit procedures were limited to the amounts recorded in the books of accounts. We have not verified the existence nor value of the fixed assets as shown on the balance sheet but have relied upon information provided to us by the finance officer.

Opinion

In our opinion, subject to the effects on the financial reports of the above qualification, if any, the financial report is based on proper accounts and presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Port Bouvard Surf Lifesaving Club Inc. as at 30 April 2020 and of its financial performance for the period then ended in accordance with the financial reporting requirements of its constitution.

Basis of Accounting and Restriction of Distribution

Without modifying our opinion, we draw attention to Note 1 to the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared for the purpose of fulfilling the organisation's reporting responsibilities under the constitution. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose.
