


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
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CLUB HISTORY

The Port Bouvard Surf Lifesaving Club commenced patrols at Pyramids Beach in Dawesville on 18th December 2003. At that time, it started with 21 members of which 9 were active on patrol. The following season in November 2004 the Club commenced a Nipper's program with 18 children aged between 5 and 13 years of age.

On 26th May 2006 the Club gained full affiliation with Surf Life Saving Western Australia (SLSWA). Since that time the Club has gone from strength to strength and is now recognised as a functional Surf Club that is successfully providing a range of services in the Peel Region. These services include, Patrols and Public Safety, Training and Education both for its Members and the General Public, Competition Fitness and Health Programs and Social Interaction.

The Port Bouvard Surf Lifesaving Club is one of 31 Surf Lifesaving Clubs throughout Western Australia, and in the nearby area the Club interrelates with Mandurah, Secret Harbour and Coogee SLS Clubs.

The ground floor (stage one) construction of the Clubrooms at Pyramids Beach was completed in March 2010. The first floor (stage two) construction was completed in July 2019. This season, the Club was able to fit-out the first floor kitchen area, allowing for commercial caterers to fully utilise the function room, bar and kitchen in the upcoming 2022/23 season and beyond.





PRESIDENTS REPORT – Cameron Baker

Welcome members to our 2021/22 season wrap up. What a season it has been, with Covid restrictions changing on a monthly and sometimes weekly basis, it was difficult to maintain momentum in some key areas, but I thank all position holders throughout the season for their time and effort in ensuring the club could meet its core expectations.

Our core business as a surf life saving club is built on the Four Pillars of Lifesaving - Nipper/Youth Development, Education and training, Surf Sports and Lifesaving. While several pillars are quite strong, we have fallen behind this season on our youth development. With a new season around the corner, the club will be looking at neighbouring clubs for ideas and programs to assist our new Youth Directors with the task this season. Our youth gave a lot this season and it is now the club's turn to give back to them.

Our Surf Sports team has strongly performed this season across all age groups and disciplines, culminating in many state medals and awards, one such award being the 2022 SunSmart Country Championship Handicap. Port Bouvard were joint winners with Esperance Goldfields SLSC with the award looking at the aggregate results of the past 3 years of country championship results, showing us just how well the club's competitors have been performing year after year. Thank you, Hiroko and your team, for the time and effort put in to training our athletes.

This year we saw 7 NRC, 8 SRC & 7 Bronze awards obtained by our members under the guidance of Tanya and her trainers, along with more specialised awards of senior first aid and ART to further hone our lifesaver's skills. With changes to these particular training awards, and thanks to a generous increase in this year's Beachsafe Fund, the club has invested in a number of new training items to boost our members first aid skills, in addition to continuing to fitout and improve our training facilities. The club is lucky enough to have several members capable of providing commercial first aid training, and this revenue stream will help ensure the club has the best coverage of equipment available to our patrolling members for years to come.

Our power craft training is in the capable hands of John H and Reece who have been conducting joint training courses with our neighbouring clubs, ensuring we're rescue ready, no matter the call out scenario. Our lifesaving members have fantastic skills, and with our relative isolation from resources compared to the metro area, we need to prepare to offer our services beyond the typical beach setting for any emergency scenario. Port Bouvard and our neighbouring clubs undertake interagency training to further enhance our skill set and I look forward to seeing these initiatives grow over coming seasons.

Our overall patrolling member numbers were down this season, a trend that rises and falls across all clubs and seasons and while we had to roll back our services from Falcon Bay, our coverage at Pyramids never faulted. With a solid increase in beach visitor and swimmer numbers, our lifesavers actually saw a reduction in rescues performed this season. Our preventative actions increased and it's great to see that our lifesavers are proactively educating the public on the dangers of our beach. On top of the Sunday patrols, our lifesavers assisted Mandurah in the joint abalone patrols throughout the summer months, as well as providing water safety to several commercial aquatic events, raising funds for the club at the same time. Coordinating these events is no easy task and I want to thank our lifesaving director Elena on ensuring they ran smoothly. As part of SLSWA's lifeguarding contracts, 4 of out patrolling members were employed as part of the lifeguard team to keep out beaches safe during the weekdays, and I encourage all new bronze award holders to apply for this opportunity this coming season.

Our Woodside Nippers program saw another surge in numbers this year, with 221 nippers this season. Thankfully our wonderful volunteer AGMs were in the capable hands of Mark and there were smiles all round each Sunday morning. With a surge in nipper numbers comes a surge in parents and it was great to see more parents getting involved with their kids, it really is the best way to ensure the nippers have a fun time and we will be looking at increasing our NRC numbers this season.

Once again we had solid numbers attend our Surf Babies program, the precursor to our nippers program. Adara took the reins and ran the program this season, somehow managing to match and often exceed the combined energy and excitement levels of over 2 dozen children, week in week out. Thank you Adara for giving your time to this program, allowing young children and their parents the opportunity to develop surf awareness and skills.


2022 saw the Cut 2 Club Swim enter its 3rd year. A challenging 3.5km swim through the Dawesville Channel, rounding the headland and making your way back to the club rooms through the surf, it offers participants a unique experience that isn't found anywhere else in the state. Even with restrictions looming, the event saw increased participant numbers and we look forward to it returning in 2023.

Taking a step back from the sand and swell, the Club has invested in the fit out of the upstairs kitchen. While stopping short of a complete cooking and HVAC fitout, Stage 1 of the fitout allows commercial caterers to operate from the kitchen and opens up the function room to a greater grange of events. Thank you John H for driving this project, we all look forward to its grand opening at our awards night.

None of this would be possible if it wasn't for our generous sponsors, donators, and our fantastic fundraising members. This season saw a new major sponsor come on board. Mandurah Nissan, backed by the Lane Group, have locked in a 3 year partnership and their support this season has been fantastic. The new club ute is certainly a head turner on the beach. Advantage Pharmacy entered their 3rd year of sponsorship with the club and their support, particularly for our first aid requirements, is very much appreciated, for an exceptional year. Our lifesavers received a boost thanks to PEACH's donation to the club, allowing for 10 new rescue boards to enter service. The humble rescue board is a workhorse on patrol and at water safety events and PEACH's donation allows us to retire the more dangerous fiberglass rescue boards. Our nippers received new body boards and training boards thanks to donations by the Rotary Club of Mandurah Districts and Wally Waters, a local benefactor supporting sporting and not for profit organisations around Mandurah. Thanks to Irene for organising the annual Street Appeal, this resulted in one of the largest collection amounts of all clubs this season which is a standout effort. Richard and his can collecting crusaders saw a staggering 250% increase in funds raised this season. The wonderful ladies at Mandurah Murray May Day Club for their donations throughout the years. Our sponsors that provide services in kind. Community members who just want to help in any capacity like our fantastic newsletter designer and producer Tanya Younger. All of you help make the club what it is today, you allow projects to run, equipment to be upgraded & provide resources for ever increasing numbers of nippers on the beach.



What a massive year. The 2021/22 season started very much on the back foot due to most of the board being new. Much had to be learnt, and very quickly, which made for a bumpy start to the season.

The patrol roster for 2021/22 saw a significant decline on previous years numbers, which saw members in new positions. With some very challenging weather conditions, there were some steep learning curves for many of our members. I want to extend a massive thank you to those that stepped in and helped during the beginning of the season, and indeed throughout. The lack of members made it difficult to run with four patrol teams this season which meant we had to lean on our volunteers more than we wanted to. Thank you to all patrol members for your efforts over the season and the many crew members who backed up week after week, even if not rostered. Unfortunately, due to the limited numbers, we also had to suspend Falcon Bay patrols early in the season.


This season we had some new opportunities arise as well as yearly engagements continuing. These included water safety events at the MCC Beach Carnivals, Lake Brockman Open Water Series, helping Mandurah SLSC at the Duel, Peel Regional Championships and a private water safety event. PBSLSC again teamed up with MHSLSC to conduct Abalone Patrols during the very busy and limited Abalone Fishing Season. Again, the community was very appreciative of our involvement and presence during the season. This season we carried out 4 patrols held between Seascapes and Halls Head. A massive shout out to John Hodges and Elena Rigoll for co-ordinating these patrols and the volunteers who gave up their Saturday mornings to make this happen. The Cut2Club swim, sponsored by Healthways WA, ran for the third consecutive year in beautiful conditions. The event saw 150 competitors take on the cut this year. They were supported by over 35 volunteers, headed by the Cut2Club committee. This event is one of our pinnacle fundraising events due to its inclusiveness, and the health message it promotes. Again, thank you to all the volunteers who made the above events a success. Your efforts make PBSLSC very proud and are much appreciated by the club and the greater Mandurah community.

This years Woodside Nippers campaign was massive, with another year of growth swelling numbers to over 230 nippers. This explosion in numbers in conjunction with the reduction in patrolling members caused a few unexpected issues in the start of the season. These being the sheer number of nippers in the water in relation to water safety available. Unfortunately, we needed to split the age groups to manage this. Obviously, it meant less time in the water at times. I'd like to thank everyone for their patience with this. It is however a good reminder to all parents of nippers that we need you to put your hand up and volunteer to ensure the success of the program for your children in the future. The nipper's program teaches our youngest members the skills necessary to safely and confidently negotiate Western Australia's beaches. The future of surf clubs depends heavily on some of these members going all the way through the program and obtaining senior awards within the club. This program wouldn't survive without the commitment and dedication of our Age Managers and Nippers Co-ordinator. I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all for your efforts during this season, at times in some very trying conditions. The success of the program also relies on equipment to be available for our nippers to use. I would like to take the opportunity to thank Wally Waters for his \$1000 donation and the Rotary Club of Mandurah Districts for their \$2500 donation towards new boards and equipment for the upcoming season. PBSLSC is most grateful for your support.

Surf sports had a fantastic year this year with some excellent results. There were some changes this year to how competitors qualify for Nippers State Championships. One of the biggest was the formation of the Regional Championships for local qualification. It was designed to encourage members from all around the state participate in the Surf Sport Championships each year. PBSLSC, MHSLSC and SHSLSC formed the Peel District, with SHSLSC holding the inaugural event. PBSLSC had 47 nippers competing. A big shout out to Hiroko Cording and Ingrid Foster for your efforts coordinating this with the other clubs and the competitors and volunteers on the day. The event was a great success, and it can only strengthen our relationship with these clubs moving forward. Both Hiroko and May Comeros held surf sports coaching sessions throughout the season, with various people helping them all season long. Their effort must be applauded and culminated in several successes in the Surf Sports Carnivals and State Championships this year. Fantastic effort team, our club was well represented all year and did us proud.



Thank you all for yet another safe and successful year. While our patrolling members dropped, we still provided coverage across all aspects of lifesaving, be it our Sunday morning patrols, abalone patrol or commercial water safeties. Beach attendance increased by 17% and swimmers increased by 23% but we saw a 32% decrease in rescues, thanks to the diligence of our patrol members. Educating the public on hazards is just as important as being rescue ready and you have all done a fantastic job.



SURF SPORT REPORT – Hiroko Cording

2021-22 Surf Sports season has been a great success, our surf sports athletes won 13 State Championship medals throughout the season (5 Gold, 5 Silver and 3 Bronze), and the club won the Handicap Banner at the Country Championships.

During winter, our Pool Rescue and IRB teams have participated in the carnivals and state championships. Special thanks to Coach Elena and Cameron who trained and developed the IRB team. The pool rescue team consisted of 5 nippers and one masters swimmers, who brought home 5 gold (Hitomi, Katie and Hiroko), 2 silver (Hitomi and Hiroko) and and 1 bronze (Amber) medal from WA Pool Rescue Championships in June 2021. That's a great achievement.

The surf season started on 30th October at the Endurance Championships at Sorrento beach. We won 2 silver (William and Mike) and a bronze (Julia) medal. It was a great start for the summer season. Surf Sports training was held at Falcon Primary School for fitness and core work at the beginning of summer season, then moved to Avalon Beach for beach training and at the Halls Head Dog beach for board training. It was great to see some new members joining the surf sports training as well as our regular competitors.

The Peel Regional Championships took place for this season's nipper state qualifier instead of the country club championships. Over 50 nippers from Under 8 to Under 13 have participated at the Peel Regional Championships at Secret Harbour SLSC on 19th December. It was challenging conditions with 1.4m swells but our nippers handled it well. 8 nippers qualified for the Nipper Championships held in March. During Australia Day weekend, we participated in the SLSWA Country Carnival held in Bunbury. We were camping together at the Bunbury Village caravan park, the nippers enjoyed staying the night together and "spotlight" after dark in the village while parents and Senior members enjoyed each other's company.

The Country Championships and Nipper and Senior Championships were threatened by a Covid epidemic, although we managed to participate in the events. The Country Championships were held at Trigg Beach on 6th March, Our athletes won many medals and the club won the handicap banner, which is awarded for the most improved club from an average point in the past 3 years. 14 nippers have participated in the Nipper Championships at Scarborough beach on 18th -20th March, Under 10 female beach relay team (Jade, Olivia, Shae and Harper) won the Silver medal and Under 13 females board rescue pair (Julia and Hitomi) won the bronze medal.

Our Youth and Senior Sprint and Flags Squad had trained hard under the guidance of coach May, they have participated in several carnivals and Senior State Championships. It was great to see senior members (Daniel, Jamie, Adara and Zoe) take the initiative at the training and work on developing their skills, being a role model for the younger ones.








NIPPERS REPORT - Mark Chalwell



- (a) The financial report was prepared on a cash basis of accounting, including the historical cost convention.
- (b) The requirements of accounting standards and other professional reporting requirements in Australia do not have mandatory applicability to the organisation because it is not a 'reporting entity'. Therefore the organisation has not prepared the financial report in accordance with any Australian accounting standards.

Note 2: Economic Dependency

The ongoing operation of the services provided by the Club and the ability to continue as a going concern is dependent upon the continued receipt of funding from sponsorship/fundraising events and upon the continued support of its members.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE COMMITTEE OF PORT BOURVARD SURF LIFESAVING CLUB INC.

We have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report, of Port Bouvard Surf Lifesaving Club Inc. (the organisation), which comprises the income and expenditure statement for the year ended 30 April 2022, the balance sheet as at 30 April 2022, notes comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, and the Certification by the Committee for the period then ended.

The Organisation's Responsibility for the Financial Report

The organisation is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report and has determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 is appropriate to meet the requirements of the constitution and is appropriate to meet the needs of the members. Qualification

As is common for organisations for this type, it is not practicable for to maintain an effective system of internal control over income and expenses prior to their initial entry into the accounting records, and therefore, no opinion is expressed on the accuracy of these amounts. However, all amounts recorded as deposits and payments have been properly reflected in the financial report. Accordingly our audit procedures were limited to the amounts recorded in the books of accounts. We have not verified the existence nor value of the fixed assets as shown on the balance sheet but have relied upon information provided to us by the finance officer.

Opinion

In our opinion, subject to the effects on the financial reports of the above qualification, if any, the financial report is based on proper accounts and presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the

Port Bouvard Surf Lifesaving Club Inc. as at 30 April 2022 and of its financial performance for the period then ended in accordance with the financial reporting requirements of its constitution.

Basis of Accounting and Restriction of Distribution
